

# Bristol Community College Fall 2009 Facts



## *Size and scope*

Bristol Community College has an undergraduate population of 11,437 (unduplicated headcount of credit students for 2008-09) and 17,923 in noncredit enrollments.

## *Student costs*

Annual in-state tuition and fees: \$3,686  
Annual out-of-state tuition and fees: \$8,136

Per credit charge of \$146 plus additional program-specific charges as applicable.

## *Budget*

Bristol Community College's operating budget for Fiscal Year 2010 is \$51.2 million, including state support of \$13.5 million and includes \$14.1 million in federal, state, and private grants.

## *This year's highlights...*

### **Rodgers Cyber Café**

Bristol Community College has created a space on the Fall River Campus where members of the community and students can relax, study, or meet with friends. This space addresses the lack of student lounge space on campus.

The Rodgers Cyber Café, located in the Farley Learning Resources Center, is easily accessible from anywhere on campus. The Café has comfortable furniture and a colorful décor.

The Café offers access to computers, a study area, and a free wireless "Hot Spot." BCC students and the Fall River community may purchase and consume hot and cold beverages and light fare in the Café while catching up on campus and world events via television monitors installed in the Café or through the wireless network using their own laptop computers.


