
These grants were awarded from private, state and federal sources and were submitted by departments across the college, including Academic Affairs, Student Services and Enrollment Management and Workforce Education Institute.

Student-focused centers at Bristol provide critical support to underserved students in an effort to foster student success and improve access to higher education.

The **Women's Center** offers specialized education, workshops, and training that empower women and welcome the entire community. In addition to raising awareness about domestic violence, single parenting and other issues central to women's well-being, the center provides media and other resources on women's issues and a free, all-gender professional clothing closet. Private and group counseling sessions are also available with a trained professional. Of the state's 15 community colleges, only three offer a women's center.

The **Multicultural Student Center** welcomes students of all cultures, identities and backgrounds. Through mentoring, advising and partnerships with the community, the center helps students succeed in and out of the classroom. The center promotes greater awareness, understanding and appreciation for Bristol's and the world's growing diverse population. The Black Student Union, Latino Student Association, Asian Student Association, Cape Verdean Club and HERO Club (LGBTQIA+) are just some of the college clubs and organizations that the center collaborates with to help give students a presence and voice on campus.

The **Joseph A. Marshall Veterans Center** provides a central place for Bristol's military veterans to seek career counseling, get help in applying for benefits, access mental health counseling or to study and socialize. The Veterans Center is an important resource for those who have served in the military and are now looking ahead to successful civilian lives.
