



THIS YEAR'S HIGHLIGHTS...

Bristol Community College "lit" New England's largest solar parking canopy, a 3.2 megawatt solar array covering 800 parking spaces on five acres of the College's Fall River Campus. The array was built with private funds at no cost to the College through a partnership with the nonprofit energy-buying consortium PowerOptions and SunEdison. It will generate more than 34 million kilowatt hours of energy each

year, enough energy to power half of the campus's electricity needs and will generate a 20-year savings of more than \$1.75 million. The energy generated by the solar parking canopy avoids the emission of more than 1,500 tons of carbon dioxide each year, which is the same as removing approximately 5,000 cars from the road.

SIZE AND SCOPE

Bristol Community College has an undergraduate population of 11,954 (unduplicated headcount of credit students for 2014-15) and 16,216 in noncredit enrollments.

Annual in-state tuition and fees: \$4,370
Annual out-of-state tuition and fees: \$9,314

Per credit charge of \$179 plus additional program-specific charges as applicable.

BUDGET

Bristol Community College's operating budget for Fiscal Year 2015 is \$69 million, including state support of \$19.7 million and \$31.5 million in federal, state, and private grants. In FY15, more than \$27.6 million in federal, state, and local financial aid was disbursed to 7,125 students. In Fall 2015, 47% of students are receiving Pell Grants and 26% of students are receiving loans.

The Bristol Community College Foundation awarded \$197,017 in scholarships and awards to 316 recipients. The Foundation issued 81 loans totaling \$14,759 to assist students.



Percentage of students who earned a degree or certificate, transferred, still enrolled, or earned at least 30 credits within six years.


HEADCOUNT INCREASE
